Instruction Offerings Summary
Fall 2020 (COVID-19 Period)

Instruction for Face-to-Face / Hybrid Courses

The number of face-to-face / hybrid instruction sessions for fall semester 2020 was negatively impacted by COVID-19. Librarians taught a total of 38 sessions, a sharp decrease of about 77% from the 169 sessions conducted in fall semester 2019. Library Instruction Rooms (and other campus spaces) were at a lower capacity due to the University's social distancing guidelines that mandated six feet of space between individuals in order to slow the spread of the virus. As a result, the Library offered an online tutorial as an option to the required face-to-face library information literacy sessions for the first-year seminar course, APSU 1000, which resulted in fewer in-person sessions.

- Librarians provided information literacy instruction to 385 undergraduate students, 23 master's level students, and 12 doctoral students enrolled in face-to-face / hybrid sections.
- Only five sessions were held in one of our Library Instruction Rooms; the other sessions were in Kimbrough (8), McCord (7), Clement (2), the Sundquist Science Complex (2), and the Morgan University Center (1). Two sessions were held at the Austin Peay Center at Fort Campbell. Librarians conducted 10 sessions for face-to-face / hybrid sessions remotely via Zoom.
- In looking at course instruction offerings by College, there were four in Arts & Letters (3 Languages & Literature and 1 Communication); two in the College of Behavioral & Health Sciences (Social Work); one in STEM (Chemistry); and one in the College of Education. Of the total sessions, three of those were for master's or doctoral level courses in Languages & Literature, Social Work, and Education.
- There were a total of 29 APSU 1000 – *Freshman Seminar* library sessions, including those through the PELP program, as well as one at the Fort Campbell Campus.
- One session was not for a course, but an orientation for master's students in mathematics conducted by the Science Librarian via Zoom.

Instruction for Online Courses

Librarians were actively embedded in 44 online courses during fall semester 2020, which is a surge of over 200% compared to 13 courses in fall semester 2019. This is not a surprising development, based on the increase in online course offerings due to COVID-19.

- Librarians provided instruction to 951 undergraduate students and 66 master's level students.
- In looking at course instruction offerings by College, there were seven in Arts & Letters (2 Art+Design, 2 Languages & Literature, 2 Music, and 1 Women's & Gender Studies); 13 in the College of Behavioral & Health Sciences (2 Criminal Justice, 4 Leadership, 4 Political Science, 2 Sociology, and 1 Social Work); six in the College of Business (Management, Marketing, & General Business); and one in STEM (Physics). Of the total sessions, four of those were for Master's-level courses in Music, Leadership & Organizational Administration, and Management, Marketing, & General Business.
- The Education Librarian provided a Zoom session for 98 dual enrollment students that was not part of a course, but an orientation to the program.
- Librarians were actively embedded in 17 sections of APSU 1000 – *Freshman Seminar*.
- By term, there were 31 Clarksville Campus Full Fall courses, two Fort Campbell Fall I courses, and two Fort Campbell Campus Fall II courses, as well as six combined courses across multiple campuses or terms (3 Fall A/Fall I and 3 Fall B/Fall II).
